



# Message from the Director



Sixty years ago a small group of families, discouraged by the lack of meaningful activities for their sons and daughters, came together to build a small center, in which they organized work activities and social opportunities for their adult children.

Sixty years later that room (green room) stills stands, and has been transformed in a number of ways. Ten years ago, it was remodeled, along with the rest of the 21st Avenue buildings. It no longer looks like a room built by volunteers, in the middle of a vacant piece of property donated by the County. Today it serves as a conference and training room.

and is filled daily with Board meetings, celebrations, remembrances, Participant Advisory Committee elections and community get togethers.

Perhaps the biggest transformation is how it is perceived by the community around us. Like all of INALLIANCE, the programs in that room started as segregated opportunities for adults with developmental disabilities. Over the last 60

years our focus has remained meaningful work and community life, and now that focus is fulfilled outside the walls of that "room" and in the communities in which people live and work.

We are very proud of the founding families who built that first room, and defied the community which often told them to institutionalize their children and walk away. We are proud of the staff who recognize that people with disabilities are capable and able to participate in their communities; our management team, who have held fast to our mission through years of rate freezes and State budget chaos; and our Board of Directors, who uphold our vision and support our efforts.

That first room was built by courageous people who wanted more for their children. INALLIANCE has grown into a positive force for integration and inclusion of people with disabilities in their communities, assisted by courageous people who continue that early vision.

# **Program Performance**

#### Supported Employment Program (SEP)

SEP provides individual consultation and job placement to individuals requiring assistance in obtaining and retaining employment in the community.

In the 2011/2012 Fiscal Year, SEP served 41 participants and employed 3 staff. Participants averaged 26 hours per week and earned an average of \$11.10 per hour. Employers included City Bicycle Works and UC Davis Medical Center. The job retention rate for individuals who have been working for six months or longer was 97%.

#### Supported Living Services (SLS)

SLS offers a variety of services to individuals who wish to live in their own homes with support. Plans to secure and maintain chosen housing and staffing are designed and implemented by the individual, utilizing the Person-Centered Planning process, in conjunction with an assigned case manager.

In the 2011/2012 Fiscal Year, SLS served 63 participants and employed 152 staff. SLS successfully developed and implemented quality employee trainings to ensure participants receive the highest levels of support.

#### Work and Life Skills (WLS)

WLS is a community based program combining vocational training and community access services for individuals who do not need 1:1 support. The desired outcome of the program is increased community integration and participation in supported work.

In the 2011/2012 Fiscal Year, WLS served 82 participants and employed 27 staff. Participants averaged over 21 hours per week and earned \$1.50-\$8.80 per hour. Worksites included Beck's Furniture, Regional Transit, Nor-Cal Beverage Co. and UC Davis Health System among others.

# **Program Performance**

#### Independent Living Services (ILS)

ILS offers 1:1 training for individuals who wish to live on their own in homes of their own. Systematic teaching methods foster independence and assist individuals to learn to perform the tasks of daily living needed for an independent lifestyle.

In the 2011/2012 Fiscal Year, ILS served 25 participants and employed five staff. Within the last year, ILS has continued to gain a positive reputation which has resulted in an increase of referrals to the program.

#### Community Training Program (CTP)

The main focus of CTP is to support individuals in the community, at job sites and in college classes that match their skills and interests. Vocational training and community skills training are provided to individuals with a wide range of intellectual and developmental disabilities requiring 1:1 or 1:2 supports.

In the 2011/2012 Fiscal Year, CTP served 144 participants and employed 98 staff. Participants averaged 1-10 hours per week, and earned \$1.86-\$10.00 per hour. Worksites included, among others, Authentic Promotions and Tap Plastics. Many participants were involved in volunteer activities at various organizations including Sacramento Food Bank, Project R.I.D.E, and Southgate Library.

#### Consumer Advisory Committee (CAC)

In 2004, the CAC began as a small group of INALLIANCE participants working to support the rights of consumers who utilize INALLIANCE services. Since that time membership has grown, and the CAC now meets every two months to ensure that all individuals served by INALLIANCE are living the life they want to live. Development of a Consumer Satisfaction Survey has been the primary focus of the 2011/2012 Fiscal Year. The survey will be distributed in the fall of 2012, and will allow participants to provide feedback on INALLIANCE services.

# 2011/2012 Highlights



## December 2011

INALLIANCE embarked on the development of a new program to provide personalized in-home care to an aging population. INALLIANCE Elder Care, designed to maintain an individual's independence, dignity and privacy, began offering services in July of 2012.





June 23, 2012

Nearly 1,000 guests helped INALLIANCE raise over \$20,000 at the 10th Annual Sacramento Chef Challenge fundraiser.

#### January 2012

The Yolo County Board of Supervisors recognized INALLIANCE for 60 years of service to the community.

October 8, 2011

El Dorado County residents came out in support of INALLIANCE at the 3rd Annual Gold Rush Fun Run. The event raised nearly \$6,000 for programs that support the health, safety and independence of people with developmental disabilities.

INALLIANCE Employment Training Specialist Connie Terranova, received the California Direct Service Provider of the Year Award from the ANCOR (American Network of Community Options and Resources.

As they sort through competing priorities, we all must remind them of how crucial these services are.

Another role the Board plays is that of cheerleader. It's our job to sell tickets to fundraising events, to promote INALLIANCE in our daily lives, and to be as supportive as we can to the staff. We promise to do a better job on the first two of these in 2013. Again, we want to thank the INALLIANCE staff for all that they do. You make a difference in people's lives every day, and we are all better for your efforts.
